Fuse Knowledge for your Little British Car

I have discovered that the British fuses used in our lbc's are rated differently than American fuses that you buy at your local auto supply store. The British rate their fuses for the amperage that will blow the fuse. American fuses are rated for the amperage that they will carry safely. These two values are not even close to the same rating. If you use a fuse with too high a rating you can let all the smoke out before the fuse blows if it blows at all.

First rule: Keep extra British fuses of the correct rating in your car.

Second rule: Make a copy of this list below and keep it in your car too, so you can buy a properly rated American fuse if you don't have the British fuse.

A very interesting article about wiring from the Moss Motors Tech section submitted by Gary Bolin

Starting in the Wet Lucas, Prince of Darkness, A Bad Rap?

I have driven my 1960 Bugeye Sprite since 1961, when I bought it new. I'm not totally convinced that Lucas should be blamed for wet-starting problems. My Sprite will start and run when even a relatively new piece of Detroit or Japanese iron won't.

If your car runs fine once it starts, but won't start in the rain or fog, chances are you have a very easily solved problem.

Most likely you have bad high voltage ignition wires. Replace them. If they are relatively new, take off your distributor cap with wires and run them through your dishwasher. For your own safety, I would suggest you do this sometime when your spouse is at the mall or somewhere else. (A wipe- down won't do as well, since the wires will still have a film of oil which will attract and hold moisture leading to a short.)

After the wash, rinse and dry cycles, make sure the carbon brush is still in the cap. Now remove the wires from the cap, clean the distributor and fire it up. If you have done it well, and you have no other problems like a defective coil, bad points, or cracked cap, etc., your engine will now start and run regardless of the weather.

I wash my wires every year or so and my Sprite and Triumph will fire right up, even after a long winter's nap, regardless of the weather.

The History Of The English Flag

If you look at the Union Flag (or Jack) closely, you will see that it is actually made up of three different flags! One for England, one for Scotland, and one for Ireland. The English flag of St. George is a red upright cross on a white background, and was used as long ago as the 13th century in the crusades.

The Flag of St. Andrew of Scotland is a white diagonal (or to use the terminology of flag heraldry – "saltire") cross on a blue background. It was added to the St. George's flag on the unification of England and Scotland in 1603.

The flag of St. Patrick of Ireland is a red diagonal cross on a white background. It was added after the Act of Union in 1801. These three flags form the Union Jack we know today.

The flag is always flown with the broader white diagonal upright, nearest the top of the flagpole. If it is ever flown upside down, with the broad white stripe at the base, it is usually taken as a sign of distress! While this destress signal was usually limited to the high seas, it was also used when the English forces were under siege, as in the Boer War, or during the fighting in India in the late 18th century.
