The primary tools of the trade employed in this effort are metal detectors to help find the disks, and hoes to uncover them if they have been covered by soil, pine needles, or leaves since the previous year, as most have.

It's sorta like an Easter egg hunt where the Easter eggs are buried just below the surface.

Once the disks marking the corners of each site have been located, small row-and-number location flags are inserted into the ground so all displayers and vendors can readily find their spot on the field.

It was a good, productive time enjoyed under a blue sky by all the BMCA ØD members who participated.

## It's all about the Preparation

Let's discuss getting your car ready for driving in the Spring and getting it ready for storage in the winter. This is just general information about storing your car if you don't want to drive it for a few months. You may find some of these steps unnecessary and you may find other steps you want to take.

Here is a thorough procedure to get your car ready to store for the winter.

Wash the car carefully. Clean underneath and in the wheel wells. Wax the car. Vacuum the carpets. Take the old McDonald's bags out of the trunk. Empty the ice chest that has been in there since summer. The cleaner your car is now, the easier it will be to get it ready in the spring

Drive the car long enough to get it fully warmed up. Change the oil and filter. Fill the gas tank FULL to eliminate as much air space as possible to prevent condensation. Adding Sta-bil to the gas is a good idea too. Check the antifreeze. Put the car up on jack stands. Cover with a breathable car cover. A tarp or solid cover will trap condensation and could cause your paint to turn white in spots. If you have a trickle charger for the battery hook it up. If not then disconnect the battery and store it in an area that is not going to freeze.

Now let's bring the car back to life in the Spring.

Uncover the car. Air up the tires. Raise the hood and check all the fluids, (oil, water, battery, brakes, clutch, carb damper)

Everything should be good, so take the car off the jackstands, put it in neutral and try starting it. If it's a Triumph it will fire right up and be eager to get on the road. But don't go for a drive just yet. Check and make sure you have oil pressure, and are not showing any warning lights on the dash. Now push in the clutch pedal and see if it will shift into gear. If you hear a grinding noise stop trying to engage a gear and let the car idle in neutral. You have a frozen or stuck clutch. We'll discuss how to unstuck a clutch some other time.

After the clutch is working properly, drive the car for a few miles and let it warm up fully. Check all the fluids again, clean and polish as desired and enjoy a nice drive.

This is a very good time to get the car lubricated, rotate the tires, polish the chrome, clean up the interior, check the wiper blades, make sure all the lights are working properly. Bob Ross
