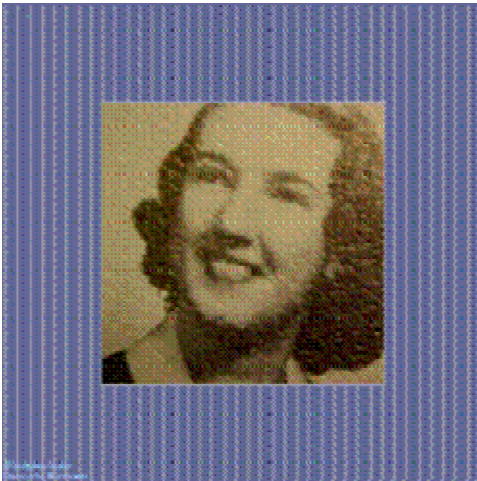

Through the efforts of reunion committees at that time, Betty got possession of the addresses and phone numbers of the members of the class of 1960. Linda opened her book store for children and teens, One Penny Time in West Monroe, Louisiana. She loves it.

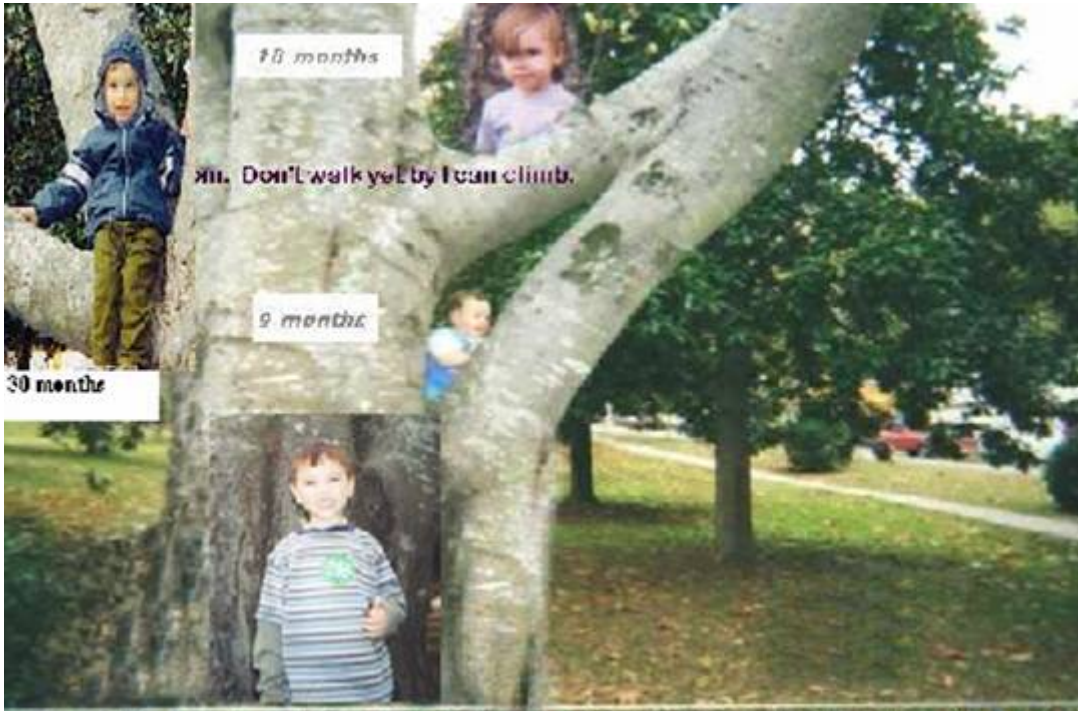
