### Sunday January 25, 2009

Our guest speaker will be David Throop and his topic is "Taking a Bet on Truth". Of his topic Dr. Throop says that "We search for truth, but we're always stuck making a guess."

After receiving a bachelors degree in chemical engineering, Dr. Throop earned a Ph.D. in computer science from the University of Texas at Austin in 1991. He currently works with advanced software on space-related problems. His current interests include essential fatty acids in nutrition and men's issues. He is married with four children and lives in Friendswood Texas. He has been a UU for over 30 years.

### Sunday January 11, 2009

Our guest speaker will be the Reverend Michael Thompson. His Sermon is entitled "Something to Shout About: Sharing the Good News of Unitarian Universalism" He writes that as we begin a new year, it's time we laid to rest our qualms about "the E-word" (evangelism) so we can "spread the word" about our liberal approach to religion.

Rev. Thompson is a native Texan who grew up in the Piney Woods, and has been a Unitarian Universalist minister for over fifteen years. He first served as a student minister in the Dallas-Fort Worth Area, then as an intern minister in Shreveport, Louisiana. For six years he was a parish minister in Beaumont, Texas. He has also served as a part-time contract minister in Houston and Galveston, and as an interim minister in Canoga Park, California. For the past six years, he has been parish minister of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

Ministry is a second career for Rev. Thompson. He came to this calling after fifteen years as a high school teacher of history, government, economics and debate. He earned his undergraduate degree in political science and public address from Stephen F. Austin State University in 1974, and his divinity degree from Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University in 1993.

In 1999 he helped organize the Beaumont Chapter of Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG). In 2005 he helped organize the Tuscaloosa Chapter of Americans United for Separation of Church and State. In 1998 he received the CUUPS Fuller-Thoreau Award "for spirited defense of religious freedom," and in 1999 he received and Anti-Defamation League award "in recognition of outstanding efforts to guard religious liberties for all."

Rev. Thompson and his wife Pamela have been married for 34 years. They are vegetarians who share their home with two feline companions, Swoosie and Xena.

### **Chalice Lighter Call:**

The Fall 2008 Chalice Lighter Call for the Southwestern Unitarian Universalist Conference has been awarded to the Unitarian Church of Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Baton Rouge is the UU church that led the way following Hurricane Katrina. This is the same UU church that has done so much for so many throughout its history, and it is now Chalice Lighters privilege to help Baton Rouge.



When Hurricane Gustav hit the Gulf Coast on September 1,

2008, it caused about \$35,000 damage to the church and its campus. Two-thirds of the damage was to the church's roof and sanctuary ceiling, with the church campus receiving the remaining damage. To date, the Unitarian Church of Baton Rouge has collected almost \$13,000 in its "Hurricane Repair Fund". Obviously, Baton Rouge needs Chalice Lighters' assistance!

Chalice Lighters is a program of the Southwestern U-U Conference in which members contribute small donations (typically \$10.00 - \$25.00) up to three times a year to help other congregations build or improve their churches and programs. 100% of the money collected goes to help the Chalice Lighter recipient. ### Recommended Books by Ann Staples

The American Plague: The Untold Story of Yellow Fever, the Epidemic that Shaped Our History by Molly Caldwell Crosby.



This book, which is at the SHSU Newton Grisham Library, was published in 2006 and is an excellent example of the style that is described as narrative nonfiction. The book deals with both the 1878 Yellow Fever outbreak in Memphis (which changed the composition of the city forever) and the research in Cuba in the earl 1900's. This engaging and beautifully written book is the young writer's first effort and her scope of research is impressive. In the notes section she describes, in paragraph form, the research for the chapters. Her approach to research makes informative reading and would be helpful for anyone doing research for any article.

The Soloist: A Lost Dream, An Unlikely Friendship, and the Redemptive Power of Music by Steve Lopez.


This well-crafted book is about two people: Nathaniel Ayers, a former student at Julliard who is mentally ill and lives and plays the violin in the Skid Row area of Los Angeles and of the author who meets him and tries to help him while writing about him in his column in the Los Angeles Times. This book is also a commentary on our countries mental health policy and on the personal difficulties, strains and rewards incurred in trying to deal with a person who is mentally ill. A must-read book from both a personal and social-commentary viewpoint. The excellent writing in this book is as expected from a journalist with over 30-years of experience who has also authored three novels

Stradivari's Genius: Five Violins, One Cello and Three Centuries of Enduring Perfection by Toby Faber.

This book, available through interlibrary loan, is enjoyable especially for those who like history, music, working with wood, or just well-written books. The author traces the histories of these six instruments, their creation, their sellers, their players, their buyers and their travels. He also tells the story of Stradivari and his workshop and the history of violin development in general.

The History of the Snowman from the Ice Age to the Flea Market by Bob Eckstein.

This book, available through interlibrary loan, sounded like a fun holiday read and it was. It is a very well researched history of the snowman with lots of illustrations. The author is a cartoonist as well as a columnist.
