April 26th, 2009

Our Speaker on April 26th will be Bill Balusek. He will be speaking on the topic of "Christian Symbolism in Art."

Mr. Balusek grew up in Dallas, Texas where he graduated from W.W. Samuell High School. After graduation, he attended Texas Lutheran College, Arlington State College (now the University of Texas at Arlington) and Texas Christian University. He received his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree with a major in commercial art in

1963. Immediately after graduation he went into the army for four years with two oversea assignments: Turkey and Viet Nam. When he completed his military obligation, he worked for several years as a commercial artist in Dallas, Arlington and Ft. Worth. He decided to go to graduate school in 1969 and completed his Master of Fine Arts degree at TCU in 1971.

He was hired to teach at San Jacinto College in Pasadena, Texas in the Fall of 1971 to teach a variety of studio classes. A few years later, as the college's art curriculum expanded, Art Appreciation and the two undergraduate survey classes in Art History were added to his pedagogical assignments. He was to teach at San Jacinto College for twenty-five years. In addition to teaching, Bill Balusek also was active in art galleries in Houston and in Ft. Worth. Additionally, during that time, he participated in competitive shows with his paintings, drawings and prints until he retired.

Among Bill Balusek's interests in art was the symbolism that various cultures and civilizations developed in their religions and how one culture's religious symbolism affected the civilizations with which it came into contact. Having attended two church affiliated colleges/universities, Bill took several required courses in religion for his undergraduate degree. Symbolism was an integral part of the art history he studied. He also has done independent research into that subject on his own.

Our Speaker on April 12th will be Billie Jenkin. The title of her talks is "Lemons to Lemonade."

Of herself, Ms. Jenkins writes "I grew up a Houstonian, graduated from high school at Waltrip, then attended vocational nursing school. I used my license as an L.V.N to pay my way through college (Abilene Christian University) with a B.S. Ed. in 1971(secondary education in biology and English). After marrying and having two sons, I returned to get a M.Ed. at West Texas A&M (Canyon) in 1978 (Elementary education).


Although I had jobs in sales and nursing, most of my "productive" life was spent in rural or small-town classrooms. If the football coach's wife needed an elementary teaching job, I got moved to secondary (and vice-versa). One of my most memorable years was spent teaching a kindergarten third-grade class! That kept me hopping! My last teaching experience was at the Wynne Unit for Windham ISD. Both in the smaller school districts and at Windham I taught in the classroom, did staff development, and developed testing and curriculum.

Since retirement from Windham (early 2000), my husband Alan Jenkin and I have enjoyed a home both in Elkins and one in Honduras (on the island of Roatan). We travel, SCUBA dive, and look for new challenges constantly. In late 2007, I decided to revisit my love of writing. As I was rewriting a story I had told my children when they were young, I received two invitations to co-write. These two books - *Wake Up Moments* and *Wake Up Women: BE Happy, Healthy, and Wealthy* - have since become best-sellers at Barnes & Noble.com.

My passion lies in empowering others to find and accept the greatness in themselves, in others, and in the alleged "lemons" that Life sometimes deals. It was with that passion that I wrote, illustrated, and chose to self-publish my children's chapter book: *The Knock-Kneed Cowboy: A Tale of Being "Just Right"... Just As We Are.* It is with the same passion that I *love* speaking to audiences about making changes in their lives by first accepting where they are right now.... *And* that very often the things that we fret about turn out to be exactly what we need.

Thinking about how helpless many people today feel regarding their lives, and how so many are focused on "bad" things are, my topic will be "Lemons to Lemonade."

► At our February 22nd service, we collected \$190.00 for the Jesus Good Shepherd Mission.




Update From the Building Committee

Beth Williamson will be reviewing *Three Cups of Tea* by Greg Mortenson and Oliver Relin for the University Women's Book Club on Monday, April 20 at 7:30 p.m. The meeting will be at the home of Carla McAdams, 86 Dahlia Rd. in the Timberwilde Subdivision, and all UU's are invited to attend.

Mortenson, the son of missionaries, had a great interest in mountain climbing. He had a fall and a serious injury on Mt. Everest and spent time recuperating in a village down the mountainside where he learned that the community had a school that did not protect the students from the elements. He decided to go home and raise money to build the town a school. When he went back up to the village every town he passed on the way up asked him to build them a school. Over the next decade, he built 55 schools, especially schools for girls, in Taliban terrain. The Taliban oppose all education for girls and women and have even thrown acid on girls who dared to go to school.





Recommended Books by Ann Staples

Descartes' Bones: A Skeletal History of the Conflict Between Faith and Reason. by Russell Shorto This book, which I listened to on 9.25 hours of tape, had

lots of information, and I cannot help thinking that it would have been perhaps wiser to have read it. The author uses the journey of Descartes' bones to tell the story of his impact down through the years. I felt that disk 8 had the most important information and that you may wish to listen to disk 8 first and then decide if you want to hear the entire book.

The Mapmaker's Wife: A True Tale of Love, Murder and Survival in the Amazon by Robert Whitaker.

The Siglers gave me this excellent book to read. It is the story of the French expedition that starting in 1735 went to Peru as part of the quest to determine the shape and circumference of the earth. Chapter two gives and excellent summary of the scientific situation of the era. In this wonderful tale of exploration and adventure, the Peruvian wife of one of the team members decides to go through the mountains and down the Amazon to find her husband after being separated from him for 20 years. She succeeds!

Animals Make us Human: Creating the Best Life for Animals by Temple Grandin and Catherine Johnson.

This is the second book of their collaboration. Grandin is known for her work in animal science and autism. Johnson specializes in neuropsychiatry and the brain. The book has a beginning section, a section each on dogs, cats, horses, cows, pigs, chickens and other poultry, wildlife, and zoos, and an ending commentary. I would recommend this book not only to people who have dogs and cats, but to everyone, since we all (vegetarian or not) should be concerned about the welfare of domestic animals and wildlife. In addition to information about animal behavior, a great deal about human behavior is discussed.

The Return of Depression Economics and the Crisis of 2008 by Paul. Krugman. This short readable book on economics is a new updated edition of his earlier 1999 book, The Return of Depression Economics. As I did not read the earlier book, I cannot compare the two. This tome gives good insight into past and present world-wide economic trends and happenings. I was surprised that there was no commentary on the influence of the rise of terrorism on the economy of countries. Paul Krugman just recently won the 2008 Nobel Prize in Economics.

The Bay Area Unitarian Universalist Church (BAUUC) will train Covenant Group Leaders on Saturday, May 2nd, 2009. Folks from other UU churches are invited to join them. This training is free and child care and a light lunch are provided.

Covenant Groups are our small group ministries. Groups meet monthly, some more often. Most have a facilitated discussion. Currently, BAUUC has more than a dozen Covenant Groups, with over 100 people involved. Many of the groups are organized around themes, such as a spiritual practice (Buddhism, Pagan, Christian) or a life situation (parenting, mental health issues.) Also, they have recently launched Connections Groups – organized around discussing life's big questions. The training covers the leadership of both types of group.
