Sunday, March 8, 2009

Our speaker on Sunday, March 8th, will be Rich Heiland and the title of his talk will be: *The Society of Friends (Quakers): The History and*

Beliefs.

Rich Heiland is currently the owner of RHScott Associates, LLC, a management consulting, facilitation and training firm, as well as the Director of the Member Experience - Cleinman Performance Partners. He is also the Publisher and Editor of the Walker Free Press, an on-line newspaper that he established in October 2008. Rich attended Miami University and graduated from Wilmington College, a small Quaker school in Ohio with a triple major in English, History, and Government. This college is in his hometown and his father was the director of theater at the college for forty years. He also earned graduate credit towards a Masters in Urban Affairs and Public Administration from UT Arlington.

Rich has over thirty years of journalism experience and was either a reporter, editor, or publisher with several newspapers in Ohio, Pennsylvania and Texas (including the Huntsville Item). He was part of the Xenia Daily Gazette reporting team that won a Pulitzer price in 1975 for the coverage of the 1974 Xenia, Ohio tornado. Of his career Rich writes that "When it comes to jobs I have Adult Attention Deficit Disorder - a lot has interested me over the years...." Rich lives in Huntsville with his wife of more than 41 years, Connie, who is an attorney with Moak and Moak, and teaches business law as an adjunct at SHSU.

March 22nd, 2009

Our speaker on March 22nd will be Nelson Thompson and the title of his sermon will be "Being RIght." Of his talk Nelson, writes that "We all want to be right. It has been said that most people would rather be right than be happy. Why is it that humans place such a high importance on being right? And what does it mean to "be right" anyway? What are the benefits and the consequences for our commitment to be right, "at any cost"?"

Of himself, Mr. Thompson writes the following: "I was born in Russellville, Alabama, in 1946, the first son of Alice and Johnny Thompson. My mother is still alive in my hometown. At the age of five, I survived polio, a disease that killed or crippled tens of thousands of children each year, until the Salk vaccine was developed -- two years later. I attended the University of Alabama, where I obtained a BS in Physics, and then Mississippi State University where I studied computer science for three years. I worked for Texas Instruments in Dallas for five years, then I moved to Houston, where I have worked for six different NASA contractors and the Baylor College of Medicine."

Currently Nelson Thompson is a senior risk analyst for the SAIC company, working on a NASA contract dedicated to the design of the next generation of manned rockets and vehicles--Constellation. He lives with his wife, Gwen, and three cats in League City, Texas.


services are local and under the poverty level of Federal Income Guidelines. One third are elderly, and many are

Recommended Books by Ann Staples

Blue Mauritius: The Hunt for the World's most Valuable Stamps. by Helen Morgan

This book is a wonderful mystery, history, and glimpse into the world of stamp collecting. Included in this volume is a glossary and a biography of each of the 26 Blue Mauritius stamps and one classified as Limbo 1. There is an extensive section on Notes and Sources and a bibliography plus information on the Mauritius Philatelic Society. One of these stamps sold recently, and this prompted me to order the book on inter-library loan.

Talking Hands: What Sign Language Reveals About the Mind by Margalit Fox. This book, available through inter-library loan, taught me a great deal about the composition and history of both sign, and spoken languages, particularly English. The books is written in alternating chapters dealing with general topics such as the history of sign language and language in general, and trips to an isolated Bedouin village in Israel where the whole village speaks a unique sign language. This unique sign language arose because many of the children were, and still are, deaf. Questions presented by this treatise include the concepts of what makes a language and how does a person acquire language.

Outliers: The Story of Success by Malcolm Gladwell.

This book, by the author of *The Tipping Point* and *Blink*, is as equally thought provoking as the previous two. This book deals in part with the idea that there are many factors behind the so-called self-made person: family, luck, when and where a person was born, etc. The author also discusses other interwoven topics such as why there are so many, shall I say, revenge shootings in the South. Another topic discusses the reasons many Asian students do better in math than American students due to the differences in educational philosophies.
