In that time, and in being involved in the local GLBT community of Bryan/College Station, not only for my own support, but for the edification of others I have seen "changes in the guard" of membership of the student GLBTA organization, have witnessed the political tides of our local "progressive community", have seen good people come and go, and have made a host of my own mistakes along the way.

Back a few years ago I met this cute young lady of cute, kinky, hair persuasion on Guess Whose Gay Panels. I began to see more of her on these panels, and as she became Graduate Assistant for Gender Issues Education Services under Beatriz Arnillas, survived through the next supervisor, and numerous interim Directors she left an impression on myself and everyone she met. Gender Issues was combined with the Women's Center being run by another friend I had been making—Brenda Bethman, and the quest was to make sure that as Sara's term in Graduate School was coming to an end, that she be hired on permanently with the Women's and Gender Equity Resource Center. Sara, in the time I met her, became an excellent resource, a person I could build synergy with in terms of getting programming such as celebrations of Transgender Day of Remembrance on the TAMU campus, and other initiatives, and became someone who I am honored to call a friend.

She is one of the few people in my life who has asked for my expertise and experiential knowledge of transgender issues and has shared credit of that contribution as she shared that knowledge with others on a local and national scale. She has been the one "straight" woman who has quickly learned all of the subtleties of the world I live in, and can truly be called a trusted advocate. I cannot say that I trust anyone more than myself with presenting this information— she is the exception.

And as a friend, she has been one of the few people who offered a shoulder to cry on when my father passed. Someone who had been through similar life experience, and someone who I became perhaps closest to outside of Robin to actually take up on that offer.

Now she has moved beyond Bryan/College Station and has become the new Director of the LGBT Resource Center at American University in Washington, D.C.—no small feat, especially considering the reputation and activism of the student body at AU.

I cannot speak more highly of Sara, and am honored to consider her a friend and Ally.



As promised, in my last update, I stated that I would make the effort to try and educate you, my family and friends, on transgender issues.

I cannot say that I can make you understand, because after 35 years I have come to a few realizations.

- 1. I cannot make anyone do anything.
- 2. Understanding is a gift that comes from an individual struggling of their own accord with the weighing and compassionate inspection of another's life. At times it comes from trying to walk in their shoes for an hour or two, but more so it comes from truly listening without judgment. And, as realization 1 implies, it is not something I can magically bestow on anyone...no matter how I may wish to.

TRANSGENDER 101:

MYTH 1: Male to Female Transsexuals who love women are not lesbians, and the women they are in relationship are really in a straight relationship—not a lesbian one.

Where do I begin to deconstruct this myth. I guess let us look at where this idea comes from. It comes from the idea that a male to female transsexual is not really the female she knows she is, but is biologically a male and should just accept it. It also deals with a misapplication and misunderstanding of what is straight and what is lesbian. Although one group of people may call an object a widget and swear to that in all of their great knowledge, the fact that it is used as a hammer, looks like a hammer, is kept in the drawer with the nails, and that 1 in 10 carpenters identify it as a hammer somehow still makes it a widget?

Let us look at the first perspective—MTF Transsexuals are really just men "pretending to be women". Ultimately this boils down to what we are going to call male and what we are going to call female. Despite the fact that in Western society we assume that we are smarter and more advanced than the rest of the world, there are different ways of viewing something as basic as sex in history and society. In point of fact, there are some societies whose definition of "male" and "female" is intimately tied to the gender (masculine/feminine/ etc) one portrays, the activities one engages in, the clothing one wears, as well as the spiritual essence an individual has and, of course, what is between their legs. As scientists who study the interaction of gender and sex look at these societies, we understand that their viewpoint may be far more accurate and encompassing than what we medically dictate in the West.

But, let us look at what we believe in the West. In Texas with the case of Christie Lee Littleton vs John Prange the 21st District Court of Texas upheld that sex was determined by chromosomes. However, the fact of the matter is that 1 in 2000 births falls outside of the arbitrary distinctions of XX female and XY male that this precedent rules. Intersex individuals with chromosomal diversity ranging from Turner's Syndrome (one X chromosome, no second chromosome being either X nor Y), to Kleinfelter's Syndrome (Two X Chromosomes, but also a Y chromosome) fall unapologetically outside this precept. And these are just two of a host of intersex conditions which prove to biologically undermine a "medical definition" of sex. Again, non XX and non XY chromosomal designations account for 1 in 1, 666 births and Kleinfelters Syndrome accounts for 1 in 1000 births. That is far more common than many of us realize or are comfortable with.. Even more shocking is the fact that the Intersex Society of North America estimates that

Of growing understanding is the fact that sex is not just between the legs, it is an identity component formed prenatally in the brain. In this perspective, during fetal development Mother Nature in her infinite wisdom provides for ultimate variety for the sustainbility of the human species. Some persons are programmed male and have male bodies, some are "programmed" female and have female bodies, some however are programmed one "sex" and born with the anatomy of the opposite sex. This is not some "mistake" or "aberration", in point of fact it is part of this greater concept of Diversity which guarantees our survival. How can someone who is intergendered possibly prevent the degradation of the human species. Frankly, I don't know. But, then again, I am not sure how male programmed/male bodies people mating with female programmed/ female bodied people prevent the extinction of the human race other than producing offspring. And, as we have seen oh too many times in reality....production of offspring alone does not guarantee a species chance of survival, it is only one dimension thereof.

So, identity is as much of a component of sex as biological anatomy. From that perspective, there is no fantasy play or "pretending" on the part of the MTF or FTM transsexuals in regard to being the sex they know they are. Scientific evidence and thought is coming to be in line with this perspective as we learn more and more about differently gendered people and their lives. And so, from that framework sexual attraction is based on who the individual knows they are and whom that they are attracted to. In a very practical manner as well, since the Male to Female transsexual knows herself as female, behaves in accordance with that, and forms intimate relationships as a female, her relationships should be identified in that regard. Further, society tends to treat relationships formed in reference to how the individual identifies and to whom she is attracted to.

So, for instance, my relationship with Robin is viewed as a relationship between two women. Society tends to regard us that way, denying us rights the way other lesbian couples are denied rights, assuming in some instances that the intimacy that we experience with each other is not as legitimate as the intimacy between a "man" and a "woman", and relegating us to an "other" status as a couple. On a personal level, the relationship between Robin and myself is that a woman with a woman. And, as a sidenote, ladies...if you think that life with men is hard, try having a relationship with an individual as emotional, "hormonal", and geared towards approaching the world the same as you. It may seem a boon, or idyllic. In reality, it is just as hard as trying to communicate with a sex that seems to be from a different planet. Because there is no difference of approach or perspective, there are sometimes obstacles that are all the more challenging to overcome.

Therefore, despite the fact that straight and GLBT alike may think or believe that the relationship between Robin and I is a "straight" one, the reality is different. The same priviledges and rights that exist for straight couples do not apply to us. The kind of intimacy we have is not "heterosexual" in any sense. Our interpersonal emotional and private lives are those of two women in union with one another. And society overall treats us as two women.

So, if it quacks like a duck, and waddles like a duck, whether or not it has a penis....it is not a widget.

TRANSGENDER TERMS:

INTERSEX – "Simply put, intersexuality is a set of medical conditions that features "**congenital anomaly of the reproductive and sexual syste**m." That is, a person with an intersex condition is born with sex chromosomes, external genitalia, or an internal reproductive system that is not considered "standard" for either male or female." ^{1.}

American Journal of Human Biology 12:151-166. **CROSSDRESSER**: Usually an individual who dresses in the clothes of the opposite gender. Please do not make the mistake of saying that a transexual is a crossdresser, or that they crossdress. For the transexual the clothes of their desired sex are their true genders clothes, and the ones that they have had to wear all of their life up to this point is crossdressing. Keep in mind too, that in our society, it is perfectly appropriate for women

to wear the clothes of men, but the opposite is not accepted. As such, one could ostensibly argue that women who wear t-shirts and jeans are crossdressing (most of us just consider it androgynous these days). NOT A TRANSVESTITE

TRANSVESTITE: - Transvestite has become a medical term typifying a condition in which an individual obtains a fetishistic thrill from wearing clothing of the opposite sex. Too many times in common usage Transvestite is used in synonymous relation to crossdressing or eonism. I strongly discourage this, as it is inaccurate and insulting. Unless you are a psychologist who studies fetishistic behaviour, you should not be using this term.

DRAG QUEEN: Typically, a gay man who dresses up as a woman for entertainment purposes. Such individuals may or may not be transexuals, as some men do it purely for entertainment while some transexuals do it to raise money.

FEMALE IMPERSONATOR: Men who dress up as celebrity women for entertainment value. This is not a measure of their degree of gender dysphoria.

DRAG KING: Women who dress up as men for entertainment value, see Drag Queen and switch the sex of the actors.

NOTE: Please keep in mind that these definitions are the traditional definitions found in textbooks and gender research. They do very little for describing individuals

TRANSGENDER PEOPLE IN HISTORY

Did you know that Joan of Arc was charged by the Inquisition for wearing men's clothes and was forced to wear a dress while in the Inquisition prisons as a humilitation?

Did you know that some 400 Civil War soldiers were discovered to have been born as women.



Did you know that throughout time men have dressed as women for political reasons to defy authorities, a notable case of which is "Rebecca and Her Daughters" Armed male peasants dressed as women in Wales from 1839 to 1844 in protest to toll roads which unduly burdened and leached money from indigent farmers trying to take produce to market. These "privately owned" roads started taking money from people already overly financially burdened just to stay alive. The Rebecca's gained popular widespread support as they led constables and officials on "merry chases through the countryside."



Did you know that the term Eonism, which is an older term for crossdressing, came from the Chevalier De Eon who was employed by King Louis XV. On a mission to Russia in order to meet Empress Elizabeth and work with the pro-French faction against the Habsburg Monarchy, the Chevalier was apparently disguised as the lady Lia de Beaumont and become the maid of honour to the Empress.



As evidenced throughout time in a variety of cultures worldwide, gender is socially constructed. What is male, what is female or what is masculine or feminine was once decided by the community as a whole and was all-inclusive [see map below].

To quote NavajoWesley Thomas who describes himself as nadleeh-like"1.

"Where I began to identify gender on a continuum – meaning place female at one end and male on the other end – I placed forty-nine different gender identifications in between. This was derived at one sitting, not from carrying out a full and comprehensive fieldwork research. This number derived from my own understanding of gender within the Navajo cosmology"

With the rise of patriarchal civilization, the need to distinguish persons on the basis of race, gender, sex, disability, etc subsumed the self-expression of many communal peoples. Nevertheless, since the dawn of history such persons of differing genders have been leaders and innovators in their times. From individuals as respected as Joan of Arc, to over 400 Civil War soldiers found to have been born female such as Franklin Thompson, and to the humble and unknown outside their own communities in which they made a world of difference in history.
