SECRETARY'S REPORT WEST VIRGINIA BASKETMAKERS ASSOCIATION JANUARY 28, 2012

The Board Members and members-at-large met on January 28, 2012 at Panera Bread in Charleston, WV at 1:30 PM for a board meeting.

She says, "The art of basketweaving has really added an unexpected joy to my life. There are so many baskets to weave and so little time."


Homespun Basketweavers
